THE STORY OF A MAGAZINE

On the 15th August 1898 a magazine was launched under the above name. It was now printed, but cyclostyled, and so hand-written. The editor was Percy W. Heward, and he was 16 years old! (See page 7)

This young brother co-operated with his father (J. Reeves Heward) and his mother (S.A. Heward), and one or two other brethren, in this venture. It was not a 'denominational' magazine, but rather what we could say was interdenominational, and with the first issue the following letter was included, which states the aim of the editor -

Dear Friend,

We feel it laid upon our hearts to issue a magazine to be published on the 15th of each month. The first number is before you, and trust you will find in it only that which is taught in the word of God. The title is chosen to stamp the periodical from the outset with the seal of Scripture....

The general effect of the magazine will we trust be an increasing love for the Lord, and a love that obeys. To this end we prayerfully sent it forth with grateful hearts for guidance in the production of the first number and with the assurance for the future(Should the Lord tarry) in the sufficiency of our God...

All profits from the magazine will be devoted to Lord's work and all time spent on its production is gladly given without remuneration.

In this first paper we see the earnestness of the young writer and his contributors and one is at once aware that although the emphasis is, Scripture and Scripture only, there were a few things which were not Scriptural.

For some reason, of which I am unaware they had at that time

a strong feeling that the Lord's coming was very near at hand, and also you will notice in the above letter the words "Should the Lord tarry", which indicates the unscriptural belief in the 'any moment' coming of the Lord.

I personally was not alive in those days, nor are there any believers of that time alive now, so the many questions one would like to ask
must remain unanswered. I have all these old writings bound into books,
right up to the last year of issue of this magazine in December 1968, and
as one reads on from the first issue, one is aware that gradually that which
was unscriptural in the early days was discarded and it became really a
magazine which was devoted to bringing the truth of Scripture to its readers,
and of blessing to many, and on the other hand an annoyance to others who
clung and still cling to the thoughts of men and their prophetical teachings which are not found in God's holy and inspired Book.

But let me say again, the editor was only 16 years old, but his grasp of truth was very remarkable, for he was undoubtedly a remarkable man, converted at the age of 4!

I personally came to know him when I was 5 years old, and he 32 and knew him very closely and I feel I can rightly say, he was my spiritual father.

But to go back to the magazine, there was so much that was encouraging. A letter included at the end of the first year, says -

"Beloved friends, fellow-labourers and co-workers,

"Thoughts from the Word of God" will continue(as the
Lord leads) telling forth of a saving, keeping. and coming
Lord, Who has called the elect, those who know His salvation through God's great grace - to be saints, to be filled,
and equipped by the Spirit, and even here to enjoy eternal
life in communion with Him, and service for Him with joy
and earnestness. Praying for His wondrous blessing and
complete guidance to all writers and readers...

We are yours in the speedily returning Lord, our Saviour and our Master.

J.R.H and P.W.H.

So the magazine went on with very useful and good articles, and was in June 1900 "the Organ of the Bible Study and Scriptural Witness Association". Those who read the magazine "A Monthly Record" will have read with profit recently, articles by J. Reeves Heward on the 'Tabernacle' reprinted from "Thoughts". But it was not yet free from the unscriptural 'any moment' teaching, for Mrs. Heward wrote -

Not all the saints shall fall asleep
The Holy Scripture saith,
But when Christ comes, saints shall be changed Made victors over death,
And in a moment, they shall be

"Caught uo" to Him eternally. Not being aware that 'the change' is "in a moment", not the "catching up

In Vol. 2 No. 9 (15.4.1900) we read, "Our friends will be delighted to hear that there is a great possibility of even next month's being printed. Praise the Lord, we do not say certainly". But No. 9(15.7.1900) was the last cyclostyled copy and August 1900 was the first of the new series printed in conjunction with a christian publisher in the city, and adverts began on the back page and the total print then was 4,000 copies. From the beginning the magazine was sold for 1 penny, or post free 1 plus a halfpenny.

In August 1901 there was an article, entitled "our Monthly Mission", which read, "It is then the privilege of "Thoughts from the word of God", to exalt the word of God, to proclaim salvation in Christ alone (Acts. 4.12), and by His atoning death (Ex. 12.21; Lev. 17.11) to adhere to the old Truths throughout, and exhort the saints (Heb. 10.24), to manifest the mystery of Christ (Col. 4.3), to contend earnestly for the Faith (Jude 3); not with caral weapons (2 Cor. 10.4), not with carnal hopes (Phil. 1.18), but as the Lord will. Looking for the coming of Christ, we are stedfast and earnest; awaking, by Divine grace, ourselves and fellow-believers to holiness in life and lip. We have no popular mission, the human conception of the presat age is anti-Spiritual, and its creedless amalgamations antagonistic to Christ! We have, however, a great mission, and we urge prayer(2 Cor. 1.11; Col. 4.2; 1 Thess. 5.17), we urge your active help, since many believers long for a bold testimony, destructive of error and illustrative of the Truth. We may err, the Divine Book never; and our aim is to attain to a closer study, truer comprehension, bolder witness of "all the counsel of God"(Acts 20.27), "as the truth is in Jesus"(Eph. 4. 21). To God be the glory for all accomplished during the last twelve months and let our friends "practice their prayers" - as adear brother recently wrote - and speed us by continual, enthusiastic, self-denying effort."

In June 1901 "The Young Men's Bible Study and Training Association" was begun with Mr Heward as 'General Secretary'.

In February 1902 an article appeared "A Plea for a Bible Institute" and asking believers to consider the establishment of such, where the pure word of God could be preached. And in 1903 "The Young Men's Bible Training College" was established, and in October of that year, the name was shortened to "Bible Training College" and in August 1904, No. 68 Fleet Street, in the city, was acquired for the College, and further particulars of the "Bible Training Colportage Association, "The Bible Training Missionary Association", "the Gospel Ministers Examination unit" and the "Stripture Research Society". So now Mr. Heward(now 21) was the Principal of the College, which was conducted on proper scholastic lines, and various brethren lectured on different topics, but on an interdenominational basis.

In 1904 another magazine began in connection with the Bible Training College, called "The Student of Scripture" contain College Notanda and propaganda" etc., which continued on as long as "Thoughts from the Word of God" in Mr. Heward's time. (see pages 9 and 10)

In June 1906 for the first time, 340 Romford Road, Forest Gate is mentioned, and \underline{I} think it was about this time that old Mr. J.R.Heward had retired from the Docks where he worked as a Superintendent and came to live here. (see page 11)

* * * * * * * * * * * * *

January 1907. The magazine began with the words. "This magazine is not merely the organ of some work...". We come almost to a new era, sudenly so much had changed. The Bible Training College was gone, and Mr. Heward explains—

(See page 12)

- (a) There is sinfulness in any identification with any forms of Christendom, including modern societies. Christians in all associations are loved, but not their associations. (The idea of our "Bible Training College" as an organization, apart from any church after God's appointment, and training preachers for varied connexions, failed to stand God's test).
- (b) It is important not to recognize diverging brethren as <u>teachers</u>. Reprints from old writers, perhaps, hardly illustrated this).
- (c) General circulation, or advertisement of books of teachers who in any way leave the word of God is not warrented.

- (e) The return of the Lord is AFTER Antichrist's reign, and will welcome ALL His people into His kingdom, although diverse shall be their rewards.
- (f) Titles like 'Pastor' as at present applied to denominational and merely undenominational officers are unscriptural, and courtesy should not suggest their
- (g) The public ministry of sisters in the assembly is forbidden.
- (h) The gospel is never to be 'offered' as though Christ died indefintely, and as though faith ensured the application of the work to the individual. Our hearts are full of gratitude for the restraining from much error that surrounds. But we must emphasize sorrow at mistakes and omissions...And united prayer will not be amiss that increased knowledge may mean increased clearness and earnestness, to the praise of the glory of His grace".

The teading of Scripture, it seems, made our brother feel that if we teach New Testament doctrine, and New Testament practice, it is necessary also to be DOING it ourselves, and so at 340 Romford Road, an assembly was soon formed, and the 'teaching' was put into practice, and the prophetical teaching was also corrected, for The Scriptures do not mention any "any moment" coming of the Lord, and of His people being removed from earth before the tribulation.

So one traces through the magazine, and it is to be seen, how the Lord was working and gradually bringing out of the normal and usual christianity,

When we come to July 1908 we read of new meeting rooms at 61 Upton Lane,

was working and gradually bringing out of the normal and usual christianity, to GOD'S christianity, and NewTestament christianity. The magazine ceased to carry adverts, and was our brother's personal effort.

When we come to July 1908 we read of new meeting rooms at 61 Upton Lar Forest Gate(see pagel3). This tall corner house was built for a Public House, but was never used as such, and so this was rented and 340 Romford Road, vacated, and also the magazine began to be printed locally. In fact the 'Student of Scripture' was set in our own type then, but printed by a printer.

In the cellar of'61' a printing-shop was arranged, with a small printing machine, and cases and cases of type, English and other laguages, and two brethren were engaged to set up the magazines, and then they were printed by a printer, for our machine was too small, and then they returned the flat pricted sheets for folding, stitching and cutting, by those who helped in the work

How well I remember as a school boy coming over to Forest Gate in the school holidays and so learned the old style printing with types and those old techniques which are no longer used. But later, for some reason, the printing brethren left, and the printer did the typesetting and printing, and finally did the whole job. One problem that arose was that the compositors at the printers had great difficulty with Mr. Heward's hand-writing, and eventually refused to compose from it any more. So all the manuscripts came to me first and I typed them for the printer. first and I typed them for the printer.

One very important change came about in October 1915 when the magazines and indeed all the literature began to be issued "FREE of charge". (SEE pages14 and15). Our brother P.W.H. wrote - "Hitherto hath the Lord helped us" - "Looking back over about 17 years of cyclostyled and printed testimony through "Thoughts from the word of God" we may well thank Him and take courage. We cannot, dare not, and would not boast, but it is a mercy to be preserved. Many things regarding His love, and His will, has our Heavenly Father deigned to make clearer from Scripture during this period, and though we would sorrow over past ignorance and failures - and more as to any which are present yet we can rejoice that He has never failed, and never will. The path may seem narrower than it once seemed, but it is not too narrow for Him, this is sufficient We would have eyes turned away from vanity, feet shod with gospelreadiness, and an enlarged heart for Himself, His people, and His word. Thus would we press toward the mark, longing to be led, more and more definitely, by the Holy Spirit.

It is our soul-desire that God may be exalted, as never before, and that more of His dear children may be reached, and some lost sinners be quickened from above through the literature. But we need to be clean vessels for such a privilege, and to avoid disregard even of His hints, yea, to hate all carelessness or dislike as to His appointments. It appears to the writer now that any unnecessary delay in a fuller manifestation that the Lord has enabled a "work of faith" would grieve and dishonour Him.

But henceforth we would seek grace to illustrate it more, to please our God and as a witness. This step is not a hurried decision: difficulties are realized; nor can we count on man, or a man-made society for support. Oh that the love of Christ may constrain us, as we remove all prices from literature now. Any other motive, or motive power, must fail. But oh that in all things God alone may be exalted, and that the enthusiasm of His people who love Him may be seen - enthusiasm in the Holy Spirit." P.W.H.

Another interesting change is well worth recording. For may years the articles in the magazine were all from the pen of our brother P.W.H. But then we notice that contributions from other faithful brethren in the fellowship began to be included.

The beautiful poetry of such brethren as E. Kirk, A.W.Howe and S.J.Duce is very refreshing. The poems of our brethren A.W.Howe and S.J.Duce I have already published, and the many poems of our brother E. Kirk, not long ago I gathered them all together for our dear Mrs. D. Kirk's personal use, to publish them all would be a costly job. * Also articles from our brethren such as S.A.Bown(my father), W. Ellis and E. Kirk helped to vary the spiritual 'diet' of the readers. (* Some have been published in booklet form).

So the magazine "Thoughts from the Word of God" and 'Student' continued on year by year circulating far and wide and in many countries, and was used of God to be a blessing to many who were brought to realize the scripturalness of their contents. So many were contacted in different places, and in some cases scriptural assemblies were formed.

There is not much further to be reported, except that the good teaching was maintained, till in 1948 when our brother was travelling back from visiting the brethren in Germany, his luggage was stolen, and almost at once pneumonia set in, perhaps due to the shock, and the Lord took him Home, at the age of 65. But my impression is that he "packed" more into those 65 years than many of us who have lived longer.

** * * * * * * *

Unknown to any of us, our brother P.W.H. had asked our brother E. Kirk to carry on the magazine if he was called away, which he did, combining the two magazines into one (see page 16), and issuing it for a further 20 years till 1968, on the same lines as before, and so witnessed to the truth till he felt he must cease, and so he wrote, "Farewell! for nearly twenty years, at the time I write this, It has been my privilege and responsibility under God to edit and send forth this magazine. It was the wish of the founder Mr. Percy W. Heward, that I should do so. Although my knowledge of Holy Scripture falls far short of his (for he was well taught in both Hebrew and Greek, the Lordgraciously enabled me to follow

his steps; and various letters from time to time, and these from many parts of the world, have encouraged me to know that "Thoughts from the word of God" has been of some spiritual help to readers.

As I am, now in my eighty-sixth year, I believe it is not contrary to the will of God that I should lay down this part of my ministry. Prayer, however, would be valued that grace may be given to continue in His service, in preaching and teaching, while life shall last. (Our brother lived till nearly 105)!

In conclusion I would express gratitude to those believers who have refreshed me by their prayers, their gifts and encouraging letters. I cannot say whether our magazine will ever be revived..."

So the magazine "Thoughts from the word of God" began in 1898 and finished in 1968 - 70 years of witness. Its value only eternity will reveal;

BUT my story is not yet ended!

In 1912 a young German, of a R.C. family, H.A. Werner, came to England to be a waiter, and he was contacted by brethren here at the Y.M.C.A. (for waiters). He was unsaved, and had always had a great longing to possess a Bible, and here the Y.M.C.A. gave him one at his request. On the evening of its arrival, he sat down and read the entire New Testament through, and then fell on his knees and sought forgiveness of sins, and witnessed next morning to his fellow-waiters of his conversion.

The contact was maintained when he returned to Germany, and then he came again on the last shipfrom Germany in August 1914, and soon afterwards was imprisoned as a prisoner of war in the Isle of Man. But eventually he returned back home to Germany, and(as Mr. Heward had done before him)he began to translate and issue "Gedanken aus Gottes Wort" in German, "Thoughts" of course by duplication. (see page 17 and note the beautiful writing. Then this magazine was later printed (see page 18) and then came to a halt during war years, and our brother H.A.Werner was called Home. After the war we were able to send a duplicator over to my brother-in-law, Daniel Werner, (son of H.A.W.) and the magazine began again, and then soon it was printed, and it is STILL issued bi-monthly. (see page 19)

Then, finally, for many years we were in touch with our dear brethren in Argentina, and our brother F.A.Franco who spoke good English(as did our brother H.A.Werner) began to issue a magazine "Pensamientos de la Palabra de Dios" Again, "Thoughts from the word of God" in Spanish, which he continued for many years till he was called Home. But now with his able devoted daughter, Lydia A. Franco(another good English speaker) and no doubt helped by her dear brothers, this magazine continues to be published. From time to time it was also issued in Portuguese for believers in Brazil etc.

So although the English testimony, under the name "Thoughts from the word of God" has ceased, German and Spanish speaking believers can continue receive help from that which was begun by a believer of 16 in 1898!


A Word of Introduction.
